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From the Desk of the Rabbi...

Rabbi Fred Raskind



Chanukah is a wonderful holiday; it's a family occasion, the music is wonderful, and it comes at the end of the secular year when we are ready for another celebration. The latkes, the dreidels, the gifts, the Chanukah gelt are a strong connection with our personal past and with the history of our people over 2,000 years ago.

But there is a serious part of Chanukah, the story of the

Maccabees and the resolve of our ancestors to preserve their faith and identity despite raging persecution and assimilation.

The Maccabees fought possibly the world's first military battle for religious freedom. They fought with weapons.

We have a similar battle today. While direct persecution does not threaten us physically, there is looming a storm from the hate-mongers of Christian Identity, Aryan Nations, and others from the lunatic fringe, as well as from the radical Islamist terrorists. They are increasing in strength of arms and numbers of recruits. They utilize the Internet to promulgate their gospel of hate. We must be more vigilant.

Assimilation is another story. It is right in front of us. What should be an appropriate response in our day and time? How should Jews here and now react?



Positively, I believe. Instead of concentrating on the impact of Christmas, as we often hear at this time of year, we would do better by just celebrating Chanukah. That's simple. Observe Chanukah at home. Take ten minutes each night and light the Menorah with your family after dinner. Recite the blessings and perhaps sing or listen to a holiday song. Play dreidel.


Wednesday night, December 17th, is our Family Chanukah Service and Dinner. Be with the Congregation—friends, neighbors, children, adults—as we recall in the words of Maoz Tzoor, the hymn Rock of Ages, 'freedom's wondrous story.' This is one battle all of us can wage—and win.

The Social Justice Committee (SJC) has been very busy the past few months. Here are some highlights:

Beginning last September, TBY, through the SJC, joined in partnership with St. Paul AME church to feed the homeless through the Dining with Dignity program. TBY volunteers work side by side with St. Paul volunteers on the 3rd Monday of each month to provide hot meals to St. Augustine families and individuals in need.

During the High Holy Days, the TBY food drive collected and donated 844 pounds of canned and packaged foods to the local food bank to help needy families in St. Johns County.

This past summer brought the Gaza war. Our TBY family responded generously to appeals by SJC Chair Al and Rabbi Fred for donations to assist Israel's strained emergency medical resources and to contact our elected representatives to show support for Israel. TBY members contributed over \$2700 that was sent to Magen David Adom, the Israeli ambulance service.

Rabbi Fred and SJC chair Al are founding members of the Saint Augustine Interfaith Community (SAIC), a project of Rabbi Fred's, to bring clerical and lay representatives of all of the major faiths together to promote interfaith understanding and discuss and address social issues facing our community. In support of the SAIC, SJC helped organize the well-attended Thanksgiving Interfaith Service held on November 20, 2014, at Grace United Methodist Church in St. Augustine. Rabbi Fred was one of the officiating clergy. This was our fourth year participating in the Interfaith Thanksgiving Service

These programs were based on Pirke Avot, Chapters of the Fathers, also called Ethics of the Fathers. It is the only tractate in the Mishnah that deals with ethics, morals, and religious philosophy with little to no legal rulings, or Halacha. The discussions, lead by Rabbi Fred, were lively and all had a chance to express their views in a non-threatening environment, had they chosen to do so. Our final program in this series will be held on January 14th at 7:00 p.m.

est, especially with the changes we are seeing, not only in our own country, but world wide as well. How will this impact the Jewish people - especially our children and grandchildren in the future? This should prove to be a great discussion as well. Bring your lunch, your ideas, and your questions! We will provide drinks and dessert. Hope to see you there!

We enjoy providing these events for you. Thank you all for your support.


BARNES & NOBLE GIFT WRAPPING December 17-24

I am now going to tackle the burying of the outdated prayer books. The rabbi will instruct us as to the correct way it should be done. We will require a bobcat and some strong backs.


The latest big project will be to paint the inside of the building.



TEMPLE BET YAM CEMETERY

Temple Bet Yam recently consecrated a portion of The Craig Memorial Park on Old Moultrie Road in St. Augustine as sacred burial ground in the philosophy and theology of Reform Judaism. This portion is dedicated to Temple Bet Yam, and all Temple members are eligible to purchase burial plots in the TBY section of the Memorial Park. Members may purchase burial plots for themselves, their spouses, their partners, their children, and/or their parents. Following Reform Jewish philosophy,

there are no restrictions concerning burial of non-Jewish spouses or partners adjacent to their loved ones.

Those interested in purchasing burial plots as part of their preplanning should contact C. J. Kidd at Craig Memorial Park directly (904-824-1672). The current cost of a burial plot is \$1800 and includes perpetual care.
