a GENIZAH.

Last month we gathered on a Sunday morning to bury old books that were worn, outdated, or unusable: prayer books, religious articles, & tallisim were among the articles interred.

Several congregants attended, including our religious school staff and chil-

dren to witness this 'first' in *Bet Yam* history: a *GENIZAH*. A *Genizah* is an historical 'burial chamber' in which sacred books and items are buried out of respect. The tradition goes back to Jewish communities in Egypt, Syria, Turkey, Israel, and Europe and took the form of a cave, closet, cemetery, crypt, or back room in the synagogue. Jews don't burn books or throw them away. We reverently bury them, with words of prayer and esteem.

We started when it became necessary to dispose of the molding and torn books. Turning a mundane act of book disposal into a spiritual moment is what Judaism is all about: We have blessings for eating various foods, drinking wine, seeing beautiful sights of nature, studying Torah---and even upon rising in the morning and utilizing the bathroom! Should not our holy books also deserve a word of solemnization upon retiring?

PLEASE DO NOT DROP BOOKS OFF AT TBY—we have no room to store them, nor staff to sort them. It will be a long time before we open up the *Genizah* again. Should you have some special books, please contact me to see if any could be of value to our school, synagogue, or rabbinic library.



This summer, commit Jewishly to one of the following:

1. Attend a service: TBY has 3 scheduled; attending synagogue in another community is always interesting.



2. When traveling, plan to visit a Jewish museum or site—and tell us about it when you return.



3. Read a Jewish magazine or book. With *Kindle, Amazon*, and on-line resources, it's not difficult; and there's TBY's library.

NEWS FROM YOUR COMMITTEES

RITUAL



As I started to prepare this article, my last as Ritual Chair, I realized that I have been doing this for five years. As I pointed out at the annual Temple Meeting last month, you would think the ritual schedule would be fairly easy; after all, it has been pretty standard for several thousand years with some minor additions caused by various calamities and historic events. After five years it was finally easy as we had no changes that I can think of.

It is interesting to note that we continue to average between 75 and 85 participants at Friday night services, not always the same people, plus one or two record breakers with well over 100 attendees.

The changes to congregational participation in services we made last year are working extremely well. The nine honors for services include candle lighting, kiddush, service men/women prayer, a reading selected by Rabbi Fred,

Ark open/close, Torah handling, and Torah blessing. This system has has significantly increased congregant active involvement in services. This year over 70 different congregants participated in Shabbat Services.

THE RITUAL YEAR IN REVIEW

- * During the past summer we had our three lay-led services by the Men's Club, Sisterhood, and Board.
- * The High Holy Days were in September and early October followed by the Festivals.
- * Sukkah-construction and decoration started on October 8th and continued for several days. Thanks to all who who helped in that effort.

- * On December 17th we had our Chanukah celebration on the second night with a small blaze of candle lights followed by a great pot luck dinner.

- * On Saturday March 21st, Zach Mayer celebrated his Bar Mitzvah.
- * In April, a memorable Seder.



rent needs and the needs of our future.





Temple Bet Yam recently consecrated a portion of The Craig Memorial Park on Old Moultrie Road in St. Augustine as sacred burial ground in the philosophy and theology of Reform Judaism. This portion is dedicated to Temple Bet Yam, and all Temple members are eligible to purchase burial plots in the TBY section of Memorial Park. Members may purchase burial plots for themselves, their spouses, their part-

ners, their children, and/or their parents. Following Reform Jewish philosophy, there are no restrictions concerning burial of non-Jewish spouses or partners adjacent to their loved ones.

Those interested in purchasing burial plots as part of their preplanning should contact C. J. Kidd at Craig Memorial Park directly (904-824-1672). The current cost of a burial plot is \$1800 and includes perpetual care.
