#### **METZAYVA LETTERS**

At this sacred season, we remember our loved ones, by attending their grave sites; in June I visited the Boston cemetery where my parents, grandparents, and uncle lie.

Poet Mary Oliver wrote: To live in this world you must

be able to do three things: to love what is mortal; to hold it against your bones knowing your own life depends on it; and when the time comes, to let it go.

On their tombstones, the ancient Romans used letters of words so familiar to them, that all they had to do was engrave the first letters, and everyone understood: I was not, I was, I am not, I care not. The Romans really knew how to let go, but how in the world could you put that on the grave of one you loved? We Jews still love, and still care, beyond death.

But Jewish tombstones also have letters that stand for words. Have you noticed at the bottom of the grave stone *Metzayva* the following five Hebrew let-



ters: Tav, Noon, Tzadee, Bet, Hay? These letters are an abbreviation for tehe nishmo/at tzerurah bitzror hachayim, which means, May his/her soul be bound in the bond of eternal life.


In effect, Roman tombstones suggested, 'Here today, gone tomorrow.' But our *metzayva letters* send a different message: the love, the influence, the value of a single life on the world, on others, is incalculable. Through our remembrance, charity, and prayers, they are NOT forgotten; and yes, we still care very much.

If you believe with the Romans that death means that a life is over and done with, why bother? The Jewish view of infinite value and immortality of the soul changes everything.

And even when dead, our beloveds' lives still teach us lessons for living. For the focus today is not so much on loss, but more on remembering and legacy, key themes for the approaching High Holy Days.

### SOCIAL JUSTICE

During June 2014, TBY Social Justice and TBY volunteers played a significant role in the *Justice Justice 1964* events that commemorated the largest mass arrest of Rabbis in U.S. history during the Civil Rights demonstrations in St. Augustine fifty years ago. Over the summer, TBY Social Justice was engaged in community outreach efforts to build bridges between TBY and other religious institutions, local government, and secular organizations.

Plans for 2014-2015 include continuation of the High Holy Days and Purim Food Drives; the Thanksgiving Interfaith Gathering that will be held at Flagler College on

November 20<sup>th</sup>; expansion of community outreach programs that will include partnering with St. Paul's AME Church on the third Monday each month to feed the homeless; developing, partnering, and/or supporting other community service programs which focus on helping or protecting the vulnerable in society, particularly the elderly, disabled, and children; and supporting our fellow Jews in Israel during the current conflict. Look for emails and notices in the Shofar concerning these and other events throughout the year.

Rabbi Fred and Al wrote a wonderful letter indicating the importance of supporting Israel NOW. The full letter is posted on the bulletin board at Temple Bet Yam; copies can be found on the table in the foyer. I asked Al to write a brief synopsis of that letter for The Shofar. If you have not already seen it, read it and get out your checkbooks!

#### ISRAEL NEEDS OUR HELP!

Our connection to Israel is more than ancestry. Through our shared history, culture, morality, and Torah, flows the life blood of Judaism. Two thousand years of persecution, pogroms, and Holocaust have taught us: What happens to some of us, may happen to all of us. We are family.

- 1. Israel is our "insurance policy" against discrimination, pogroms, and expulsion that earlier generations did not have.
- 2. Anti-Semitism worldwide, at levels not seen since the Holocaust, is intended not only to delegitimize Israel, but the rights of Jews everywhere.
- 3. The US-Israel alliance has been shaken by the U.S. Administration's harsh public criticism of Israel, pressure on concessions, and restrictions on the sale/transfer of arms while referring to Hamas' use of human shields as merely "irresponsible."
- 4. The finances of MDA, Israel's ambulance service, Hadassah Hospital and others who treat thousands traumatized by the sirens or injured by rockets are stressed.





### TEMPLE BET YAM CEMETERY

Temple Bet Yam recently consecrated a portion of The Craig Memorial Park on Old Moultrie Road in St. Augustine as sacred burial ground in the philosophy and theology of Reform Judaism. This portion is dedicated to Temple Bet Yam, and all Temple members are eligible to purchase burial plots in the TBY section of Memorial Park. Members may purchase burial plots for themselves,

their spouses, their partners, their children, and/or their parents. Following Reform Jewish philosophy, there are no restrictions concerning burial of non-Jewish spouses or partners adjacent to their loved ones.

Those interested in purchasing burial plots as part of their preplanning should contact C. J. Kidd at Craig Memorial Park directly (904-824-1672). The current cost of a burial plot is \$1800 and includes perpetual care.

### **CONTRIBUTIONS**



The custom of making offerings/donations as an expression of prayer traces back to Biblical times and has always been a practice of congregations. A donation can be defined as an act of prayer in which the participant extends himself or herself beyond the act of uttering words. It exceeds mere vocal expression and

indicates that an act of personal sacrifice has been performed by the donor. The amount of an offering is less important than the deed. A small offering made by a person of limited income is as noble in nature as a larger one given by a person of wealth. THE WORLD IS SUSTAINED BY THREE THINGS: BY TORAH, BY WORSHIP, AND BY TZEDAKAH.

At the annual congregational meeting on May 18th, three new funds available for member contributions were approved. A brief explanation follows. The funds were fully defined in the information sent to all congregants 30 days before the meeting.

- 1. Education Tuition Reserve Fund to provide tuition assistance to Temple members who want to give their children a Jewish education,
- 2. Religious School Reserve Fund to pay for programs and activities for the religious school, and
- 3. Torah Fund designated for the repair and replacement of the Temple's Torahs.

Please note that there are separate forms available in the Temple office for plaques for both the Memorial Board in the sanctuary and for the Celebratory Wall in the garden. Do NOT use the attached Contribution form for this purpose.
