

From the Desk of the Rabbi...

WHY I WENT TO WASHINGTON

1st, it was a great personal honor, a once-in-a-lifetime experience to participate in the story of our day. To me and to many others across the political spectrum, this

interfaith service on the national scale is about the office rather than the officeholder. It celebrates the peaceful transition of power from one administration to the next. When we look at the world scene, we see how in many nations, political power comes through corrupt cliques or revolutions and assassinations. The opening commentator said: 'this is not celebrating the victory of Donald Trump. It marks the celebration of American democracy & our national heritage'.

2nd, over the years I've been heavily involved in interfaith community and worship. Here in St. Augustine, I co-founded SAIC, spoke at community services, preached at UU, given invocations at Veterans Day commemorations and at dinners at Flagler College. I've taken part in the Service of Healing and was proud to be involved in the 450th anniversary of St. Augustine. In the past, I've addressed a high school baccalaureate service, a university commencement, and given the invocation at the 1981 UGA homecoming game.

This service was 'diversity on parade', involving clergy & religious representatives from a gamut of faiths and denominations: Muslim, Sikh, Hindu, and Christian. I spoke with the leader of the Greek Orthodox Church in America; 3 weeks later he was in town here at the Greek shrine.

The pomp and ceremony of the Episcopal National Cathedral are hard to describe: watching national leaders and the 1st family at worship was

quite moving, and the music was magnificent. On the recessional, I greeted a smiling Ivanka & Jared 'Shabbat Shalom'.

3rd, while not representing TBY or the views of its members, I accepted the invitation knowing full-well of potential controversy. But Judaism needs to play an equal role in the interfaith drama of America. Should vast numbers of non-affiliated, secular, Conservative, Reconstructionist and Reform Jews be unrepresented at this national event?

Dozens of friends, neighbors, congregants and even strangers understood the clear difference between endorsing a candidate, a personality, a policy, or a party and offering prayer at a national forum in honor of our inauguration. Best example: Cantor Mikhail Manevich of Washington Hebrew Congregation, who chanted the *Shema & V'ahavta*, had been the 1st Cantor 4 years ago at President Obama's Inaugural Service.

The message is: clergy select the prayers, not the President, and in this very, very conflicted time, just about anything is being politicized. I had hoped that the service might lead to some sense of confidence, prayer for a higher standard of behavior—on both sides of the divide—and at least the beginning of some dialogue. Apparently, that's going to take a while. Yes, there is fear and worry and anxiety in our nation and among many of our people, because we know from past history that whether left or right, demonstrative or reticent, cooperative or resistant, Jews can get caught in the middle—and may become potentially vulnerable.

Politics or government can be very important to us, because it drives everything from health care, economics and foreign policy to our civil rights. . But far more important should be our faith, family, friends, career, neighbors and this our TBY family who support and care for one another in times good or bad—regardless of political persuasion. I accepted as a gesture of hopefulness.

While often we refer to "holiday" traditions during the winter season, Temple Bet Yam is rich with traditions throughout the year. For those of you who recently enjoyed our annual Deli Night or are busy baking hamantashen, I readily admit

that many of our traditions are closely associated with delicious food!

But our Temple traditions extend far beyond our taste buds and our social calendars. Our traditions include our volunteers at the front door every Friday night service. They welcome each and every one of us as we enter with a smile and a warm greeting, and make sure our guests feel as special as our members. Some of our traditions are considered so vital to who we are as a congregation, such as the children being invited to participate in the candle lighting and our Passover Seder, that they are written into our Temple Bet Yam by-laws.

Tradition is typically defined as a belief or behavior that is passed down from generation to generation. Often accompanied by a symbolic meaning, the action serves as the gateway for sharing that custom with others. As Phyllis Keiser has told me over and over since we first joined Temple Bet Yam, there are certain things that are the *minhag* of our congregation. Our *minhag* is made up not just of our annual celebrations and fundraisers, but also our core values, such as compassion and social justice. Temple Bet Yam is known as not only a caring and spiritual congregation, but as a congregation that recognizes the value of differing opinions and beliefs. We strive to be inclusive of all persons and avoid discrimination at all costs.

A tradition requires that the present generation act so that the behavior may be observed and assimilated by our future generations. It is our obligation to our children's children to practice these customs so that their importance will not fade away. Along with greener yards and warmer weather, spring brings to Temple Bet Yam a reminder that we must begin planting the seeds to carry on our traditions in the upcoming years. I encourage each of you to consider how you will contribute to furthering our traditions. Whether it is joining the Board, becoming a more active member of a committee, bringing a rake to the spring clean-up, or driving a fellow congregant to services on Friday night, everything we do to recommit ourselves to our congregation and our principles ensures the longevity of our Temple for future generations.






Meet our new accompanist!

...And that famous recipe of Norma's...

MONDELBROT

3 eggs 1/2 tsp. lemon rind peel

1/4 lb melted butter or Smart Balance 1/2 lb. dates

1 c sugar 1/2 lb. walnuts, chopped

1/2 tsp. orange rind peel 2 1/2 c. flour

2 tsp. baking powder

Heat oven to 350°

Line a cookie sheet with parchment paper.

Oil and flour the parchment sheet, or use a cooking spray for the oil.

Chop dates and walnuts.

Mix together the eggs, butter, and sugar.

Add rinds, dates, and walnuts.

Add flour and baking powder a little at a time, and stir until thoroughly mixed.

Shape into two long rolls on the lined cookie sheet.

If the batter is too sticky, add a little extra flour.

Bake at 350° for 45 minutes, or until brown.

Test with a toothpick.

Remove from oven and cool.

Place the two loaves on a cutting board and slice into 3/4 inch pieces.

Return pieces to the cookie sheet on their sides and put back in the oven for 5 to 8 minutes to toast.

Remove from oven and cool before putting into a sealed container.

Freezes well.
