

From the Desk of the Rabbi...

Rabbi Fred Raskind



I remember the old television series, *Have Gun – Will Travel* [1957-1963] with Richard Boone and his role as Paladin, the intelligent and sophisticated but tough gun-for-hire in the late 19th-century American West. Boone won Emmy nominations

in 1959 &1960.

In the 1960s and 1970s, Boone assisted the Israeli film industry at its inception. He appeared in the first Israeli-produced film shot outside Israel, the Western *Madron* (1970). In 1979, he received an award from Israeli PM Yitzhak Rabin for his contribution to Israeli cinema.

Richard Boone moved to St. Augustine, Florida, in 1970 and worked with the production of *Cross and Sword*. During the 1970s, he wrote a newspaper column for the *St. Augustine Record* called, "It Seems to Me", and gave acting lectures at Flagler College in 1972–1973. In the last year of his life, he was appointed Florida's cultural ambassador. He died in St. Augustine of pneumonia; his ashes were scattered in the ocean.

Boone's father was a descendant of a brother of frontiersman Daniel Boone, but his mother, the daughter of immigrants from Russia, was Jewish!

All this occurred before Temple Bet Yam was organized. TBY was founded as an anchor, a place for talented, diverse, and interesting Jews to gather. As we approach a new year, let us continue to seek out, invite, and attract the many Jews who are arriving here in large numbers—for their benefit as well as our own as a Jewish community. After all, wouldn't it have been fascinating to have talked to Richard Boone?






SOCIAL JUSTICE

Please watch for announcements about this year's Interfaith Thanksgiving program scheduled for November 20th at the Basilica.





Until next time remember, God loves humming.


