### From the Desk of the

### Rabbi... Rabbi Fred Raskind



Most of us like to travel, to take trips, especially to other parts of the country or world. Travel is fun, broadening, interesting, and gives us a perspective on living. Some years back, I took a cruise to the Eastern Caribbean. At one of the ports of call, I arranged a visit to the historic Hebrew Congregation of St. Thomas in the US

Virgin Islands. Several of our members have been there, I'm sure. I plan to return at some point.

This congregation was founded in 1796. The present building was erected on "Synagogue Hill" in 1833, and is the oldest synagogue in continuous use under the American flag.

Built in the Sephardic style, the pews face one another and the pulpit is on one side, opposite the Ark on the eastern wall. The congregation maintains two historic cemeteries and a lovely gift shop. The floor has sand as a reminder of the Exodus from Egypt.

In nearly every corner of the globe there are Jews, and in many towns, a synagogue. It puzzles me that so many of our people go on vacation and "leave Judaism at home." We can learn so much about history, art, architecture, and religion from visiting sites of Jewish interest—but we have to plan a bit beforehand.

I found the synagogue visit one of the highlights of the trip, a rich investment for only two hours. "Well," you might think, "after all, he's a Rabbi." Not really: It's because I'm a Jew interested in my heritage.

So on your next vacation—even if it's to a neighboring state, find out potential sites of Jewish interest, and visit one. It will enrich you and those with whom you share the experience.

We were focused on preparing for the High Holidays. Clean up around the exterior of the building along with touch-ups indoors were ac-

complished.

We experienced some downed trees, branches and debris and rainwater intrusion as a result of Hurricane Matthew. Because of water intrusion, it is recommended that carpeting be removed in the office so we can locate point of entry.

Chuck Meiselman has offered to take on the task of installing a window in the door from the corridor into the corner classroom to accommodate current statutes. Thank you, Chuck.

I had the septic system checked, tested, and evaluated by Burney's Septic. The system is operating properly. Holding tanks and control panel are now padlocked which meet the statutory requirements.

A broken window was reported which has now been fixed.

Special thanks to several members for aiding our efforts these past two months: Phyllis & Maury Keiser (and Jake); Chuck Meiselman (and Tyler); Richard Zicht; Benjamin Feldman; Sue Kinkela; et al.

Items on the facilities to-do list:

- 1. Replacement of the damaged STOP sign.
- 2. Repair and/or discarding of a number of broken chairs.
- 3. Temple inventory must be completed (tentative for January 2017).
- 4. Three quotes must be obtained for replacement of sanctuary carpeting.
- 5. Consideration is under discussion for removal of the carpeting in the secretary's office, inspection for source of water intrusion and repair of same, and the flooring replaced with other than carpeting.


# Trees for Israel


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
