From the Desk of the Rabbi...

Rabbi Fred Raskind



Chanukah is a wonderful holiday: It's a family occasion, the music is wonderful, and it comes at the end of the secular year when we are ready for another celebration. The latkes, the dreidels, the gifts, the Chanukah Gelt—are a strong connection with our personal past and with the history of our People over 2,000 years ago.

But there is a serious part of Chanukah, the story of the Maccabees and the resolve of our ancestors to preserve their faith and identity, despite raging persecution and assimilation. The Maccabees fought possibly the world's first military battle for religious freedom. They fought with weapons.

We have a similar battle today. While direct persecution does not threaten us immediately, there is a storm looming from the hate-mongers of Christian Identity, Aryan Nations, and others from the lunatic fringe. They are increasing in strength of arms and numbers of recruits. They utilize the Internet to promulgate their gospel of hate. We must be more vigilant.

Assimilation is another story. It is right in front of us. What should be an appropriate response in our day and time? How should Jews here and now react? Positively, I believe. Instead of concentrating on the impact of Christmas, as we often hear at this time of year, we would do better basically by celebrating Chanukah. That's simple. Observe Chanukah at home. Take 10 minutes each night and light the Menorah after dinner. Recite the blessing and perhaps sing or listen to a holiday song. Play dreidel. Attend either the Sisterhood or Men's' Club dinner for Chanukah.

Friday, December 15th, is our Family Chanukah Shabbat Table Service and Event. BRING YOUR MENORAH TO JOIN IN THE CONGREGATIONAL MENORAH BLESSING—as we recall in the words of Maoz Tzoor, the hymn Rock of Ages, 'freedom's wondrous story.' This is one battle all of us can wage—and win.

At the risk of slighting the many members who are working on these projects and are much appreciated, I want to thank our Facilities Chair, Frank Kinkela, for coordinating the effort to get things done. We are tremendously grateful for all your work on behalf of the Temple.

In spite of Irma's attempts to bring us down, this has been a busy, positive time for us. We enjoyed a beautiful High Holiday experience. Our dynamic Ways and Means events, Sisterhood, Men's Club, and Lifelong Learning have offered a variety of activities to entice us to spend more time with our TBY family. My appreciation also goes out to Terry Cohen and the other religious school teachers for making Sunday mornings a wonderful, meaningful experience for our children. It is so heartwarming to hear that they go home each session with big smiles on their faces while they recite what they have learned.

Mitzvah Mob









WEDNESDAY DECEMBER 6TH [10-11:30]:

Maccabees is not one of the 5 Megillah books that are connected to a Jewish holiday and theme. The 4 Books of Maccabees are found in the Apocrypha (which appears only in the Catholic Bible) and tell the story of Chanukah. Read on-line Maccabees Books I & II which contain the main ideas. Rabbi Raskind will give a brief background on when it was written, who wrote it, and what was going on at the time. We will go over key passages that have become familiar in Jewish history and its lessons for us today.

ON SUNDAY, DECEMBER 10TH, Rabbi Raskind will discuss the topics below at a special meeting for parents during religious school, beginning at 9:30 a.m. and lasting approximately an hour. All TBY members who want answers to these questions are invited to attend.

- ► How do we see the message & ideas of Jewish holidays compared to our national celebrations?
- ► Which American holiday is *Chanukah* most like? [Hint: Not Christmas!]
- ► What do *Succot & Thanksgiving* say beyond "harvest, fruit, or turkey"?
- ► How do we help children, friends, or relatives better understand connections between American and Jewish calendar events?
