

## From the Desk of the Rabbi...

#### **PURIM—HAPPY OR SAD?**

In March we celebrate Purim with a costume parade for the children and the joyous, raucous reading of the *Megillah*. We think of Purim as a fun holiday because of the costumes, masks, songs, and the tasty hamantashen.

Even our *Megillah* reading is punctuated with noise and groggers. Traditionally, Purim was celebrated in the same way our secular New Year's Eve is—with partying, drinking, and dancing.

What is the message of the *Megillah*, whose text is the *Book of Esther*? A Jewish heroine and her uncle [Esther and Mordecai] foil a plot by the evil Prime Minister Haman to slaughter the empire's Jews. In the end, Haman receives just retribution, and the Jewish population is spared by the courage of Esther and Mordecai. On Purim, we rejoice.

Yet, there is a serious Purim lesson we often disregard: systematic, government-sponsored anti-Semitism, which has threatened our people throughout the centuries. From the Spanish Inquisition, Czarist pogroms, the Nazi Final Solution, and the Soviet gulag to Arab militancy, we have seen many an Ahasuerus ready to persecute Jews for political/financial gain.

Historical circumstances change, but the rationale for Jew-hatred remains the same: "There is a certain people scattered abroad and dispersed...their laws are different from those of every people..." [Esther 3:8-10]. In other words, Jews are different, therefore potentially subversive—and so, vulnerable.

Sadly, world events even today reflect this Purim lesson.

Our Chanukah dinner/service was a memorable occasion with a packed audience of proud parents, grandparents, and wanna-be parents and grandparents qvelling as we watched our religious school children present their play. In October, we once again sold out the house at the Limelight, to laugh hysterically while watching *The Full Monty*, with a cast that included our own Steve Rich. Our choir keeps introducing new songs or new versions of old songs that add to the beauty of our services. And of course, I can't ignore the success of Deli

Nite, which always satisfies the cravings of our Temple Bet Yummy members. We enjoyed our feast of delicious corned beef and pastrami, but we also feasted on the entertainment of our inhouse magician, Bill Rosenthal. The facilities team appreciates this opportunity to provide an update on the building and the property:



- Evaluating the roof for needed repairs
  - Roof has been inspected and is in good condition for its age
- •Exploring our options for re-grading the area close to the building to accommodate improved rainwater control
- This project is still being investigated
- Inspecting and air testing the building for mold
  - Air quality in the building tested good to moderate
  - The Board has chosen to enhance the air handling system in the Temple by adding particulate filtration and UV lighting for bacterial control. This project is scheduled for March 2018.
  - A small remediation repair will be required in the rabbi's office.
- Investigating needed repairs to the exterior stucco
  - Inspection completed and repairs facilitated
  - In addition, the Board has voted to repaint the exterior of the temple and the sign. This project should be completed before you read this.
- Obtaining quotations to clear the storm-downed trees
  - Project completed
- Working with our insurers where possible
  - TBY experienced no insurable losses

We have a few other items on the to-do list. The pending projects mentioned herein will continue to take priority at this time because of the long term care of our temple and the health of our congregation.

Many thanks to our TBY facilities ad hoc committee, Marty Cohen, Richard Zicht, Michael Speisman, Lee Feirman, and Chuck Meiselman for their time and efforts in moving these projects forward.
