Preparing for Revelation

The period between Passover and Shavuot is an important time for the Jewish

people. While Passover marked the start of liberation, the Torah describes the journey from bondage to freedom as a lengthy process: the children of Israel wandered in the wilderness for 40 years.

Rabbinic tradition understands these years as a necessary time of transition and preparation – one of discarding old beliefs and shedding old habits. The years of bondage had taught a culture of blame, fear and resentment. It would take years to shift to trust, accountability and compassion. The underlying message is that beliefs and habits can enslave us or free us; they are often unconscious, but they hold tremendous power.

This is also an important reminder that change does not happen overnight. We are often impatient when change does not happen as quickly as we expect, and we begin to believe that it won't happen. But change happens in stages, and every stage is an important step that can lead us to true transformation.

The rabbis teach that every year, at this time, we should reflect on old habits – to

let go of those that do not help us and work on building new ones. The period between Passover and Shavuot, corresponds to the seven weeks between the exodus from Egypt and the giving of revelation on Mt. Sinai. During this time, many Jews engage in a process called "counting the Omer" which has an ancient Biblical and agricultural basis, but also a spiritual one. It is a time to reflect on the habits and beliefs that keep us from being our best selves.

We frequently speak about the devastating consequences of unhealthy habits such as smoking or addiction. But beliefs can be just as powerful, and like any habit, they can be learned or unlearned. The tendency to find the negative or the positive in any situation is one such "cognition habit." Can we develop a habit of gratitude? What about our self-talk? Is it compassionate? How often do we tell ourselves: "I am so stupid!" if we make a mistake? What would it look like if we embraced our mistakes as opportunities to learn and grow?

One powerful way to reframe old beliefs, and to acquire a more positive and compassionate outlook, is to begin adopting new spiritual practices that can help to rewire our brains and thought patterns, so that we can come to a place of acceptance-

On March 13th, I taught a class that introduced some of the practices and blessings that the rabbis of the Talmud instituted to help us begin to see the world through a sacred lens.

This coming month and through early May, I am excited to be co-leading a special three-part class with our temple member, Clare Collins, who just completed an intensive two year training course on how to teach meditation and mindfulness. Together, we will facilitate this special course to focus on the "saging process" which our rabbis have taught is the essence of revelation. We will prepare ourselves for the holiday of Shavuot by learning the spiritual skills and practices that can help us to reexperience revelation in our own lives.

Regardless of whether you choose to join us for these special Torah lessons (the Saturday morning after we have a Shabbat service), I pray that this period of time between Passover and Shavuot ushers in a time for us to be filled with health and healing, with kindness and wisdom. May our beliefs and habits help us, not hinder us. May we find new ways each day to become ever more compassionate and may the coming holiday of Shavuot lead us all to blessings, revelation and acceptance.

Did you know that the TBY calendar of events and services is on our website, templebetyam.org, and is downloadable to your computer or phone? When the internet first became widely usable, my reaction was amazement at how much information was seekable. Now, many of us are used to "googling" anything and everything! To me, what is remarkable is how much information

is available about Jewish things: history, prayers, meaning of holidays, words, phrases, translations, and more.

Why does this come up for this article? The deadline for Shofar articles is the 15th of the previous month. So, while I'm writing this, we're excited about Pesach. But the Seders will be over by the time you get this edition of the Shofar. So what comes next? Shavuot. Shavua means "week", and Shavuot is the plural form. Shavuot occurs seven weeks after Pesach. In the Christian world, Pentecost (I just googled the word) refers to the descent of the holy spirit on the followers of Jesus while they were in Jerusalem celebrating the Feast of Weeks, or Shavuot. So: Shavuot occurs on the 50th day after Pesach begins, and Pentecost has been stabilized as the 7th Sunday after Easter.

Traditionally, the days between Pesach and Shavuot are marked by the Counting of the Omer (a measure of grain). During the counting of the Omer, some activities, such as weddings, are not held. But for reasons you can google, weddings are permitted on the 33rd day of the Omer, or "L'ag b'Omer" (Lamed, Gimmel). See my earlier article on Hebrew gematria! Why do some people know a little fact like this? Because it's our anniversary. I believe there are at least three couples in the TBY crowd whose anniversary is Lag B'Omer. Larry's and my fiftieth was kind of quiet, at home, serenaded by the St. Augustine Pirates, but the 51st is looking livelier!

What is Shavuot all about? On Pesach (Passover) we celebrate our escape from Egypt and bondage. On Shavuot, we celebrate Matan Torah, the giving of the Torah to all 600,000 of us who were standing at the foot of Mt. Sinai. By the way, our tradition holds that somehow we were all there—all the Jews of today, whether by birth or choice, were at Mt. Sinai together. It's a holiday that is often overlooked, partly because it falls at the

end of the school year, it's close to Memorial Day in this country, and it's only a one or two day holiday, not eight days like some others. It also doesn't have all the food traditions that Pesach does. The only one I know of is the tradition to eat dairy foods, perhaps celebrating our Land of Milk and Honey, the Promised Land, Israel. I vote for Baklava Cheesecake!

And, now that you've heard the meaning of Shavua, the greeting at the end of Shabbat, on any Saturday night, is Shavua Tov—may you have a good week.

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
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






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
