Hanukkah: A Time for Light and Miracles

We all know the story... a little bit of light, only enough

oil for one day, miraculously lasting for eight days...just enough time for the Maccabees to make more...so that they could rededicate (Hanukkah=Hebrew for dedication) the Temple by rekindling the Eternal Light in front of the Holy of Holies...

The Maccabees, small in number but mighty in spirit, who bravely summoned their might and courage to defeat the massive Seleucid Empire against all odds...and had just recaptured their beloved Temple, in Jerusalem, that had been overrun by pigs and ancient Greek gods...the battle-weary Maccabees who were trying to sweep it clean from all the broken glass and the remnants of what had once been their sacred and holy space...

One can only imagine how exhilarated but exhausted they must have been, and then the crushing devastation of entering that once sacred space, hallowed by generations of memories and thousands upon thousands of people, praying, crying, rejoicing...to find the Eternal Light, representing G!d's abiding presence, extinguished, pigs roaming freely, and much worse...

To start again, when we feel empty...to be pushed to the end of one's rope, and to be forced to keep going...to push past one's limits...to go beyond what one thinks is possible, and to keep going, trying, starting over even when there is

no logical and rational way for it to be possible... to see the darkness of the Temple, the broken glass, and to find the strength, nevertheless, to rekindle that lamp, even when there is barely any oil...to do it anyway...to keep trusting... to keep trying...forcing one's self to do the irrational....reaching deep into the depths of one's being to try...to believe...to kindle light...

This is Hanukkah...it is the triumph of the Will... it is the ability to go past one's limits and keep going...it is the faith to kindle Light even when it seems evident that it will be extinguished immediately...it is clinging to hope even when everything is telling you to give up....

Hanukkah...it comes at the darkest time of the year...it is the reminder that when we are bathed in darkness, we must kindle light...when we want to give up, we must push ourselves past our desire to give up and find the strength to search out light...and then to place that light at the window...to share that light with someone else...to remind others, who are lost in the darkness...that miracles are possible...that we have experienced miracles before and that they can happen again...but only if we do our part...

David Ben-Gurion, Israel's first Prime Minister famously said: "In Israel, in order to be a realist, you must believe in miracles". And indeed, Israel is another example of this same indomitable spirit, this unique mixture of hope and faith, of tenacity and audacious courage, that is the essence of the Jewish spirit...the essence of Hanukkah...that is best expressed in our national anthem: Hatikvah (=the hope).

Because this Hanukkah spirit is what animated those first brave pioneers, who had survived the Holocaust, working themselves beyond human limits, pushing past all odds, defying everything, page 2 The Shofar

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only to brave the journey to the promised land and to drain the swamps and plant trees in the desert and extend olive branches to those who declared war against them and vowed to drive them into the sea...and to nevertheless keep trying...to keep planting trees despite how many times those who hated them would burn down their forests and much worse...

This is Hanukkah...the triumph of the spirit... the ability to keep forging forward when every part of you says, give up...this is Hanukkah... to kindle light when you know it will be extinguished and to see a flame last longer than it should and to recognize it as a miracle...

No less than Moses stood at that bush in the desert...that bush that was burning as likely many bushes did burn in the desert...and to stop and watch...always looking for a miracle...and to recognize that this bush was not consumed by the fire...how many bushes had he stopped at before he heard a Voice that changed history for us all? And so it is that it is 2020...and many of us are weary...and many of us want to give up...and many of us have begun to wonder if Light and hope and miracles are still possible...and many of us may be struggling...many of us are trying to make ends meet against all odds...and many of us are praying that a few drops of oil will last...a few dollars can somehow be enough to feed a family and keep a roof over their heads...

For those of us who have any light...any ability to give...however little it may seem...now is the season to trust that even the smallest amount can be someone else's miracle....There are many ways to give light...from reaching out to someone we have not spoken to in ages...to donating to a fund like the Murray Weiss Fund which was specifically created for times like these...so that those who are struggling can be blessed with miracles...

This Hanukkah, may we be amongst those who kindle light and remind others that miracles are possible...May this season renew our faith and strength, our courage and our will...and may we share what light and hope that we have with all those that we encounter...for who knows what history is waiting to be written by one who is able to discern the sacred power of Light that others discount?
