The Torah of another Zoom Passover

One year ago, we were hugging each other (I almost wanted to rename us Temple

Bet Huggy) because we were so warm and effusive, even our beloved security officer, John Tedder, would greet us with a warm hug when we entered our beautiful synagogue...

One year ago, we were enjoying Temple Bet Yummy's famous onegs as I would gather all of the children together to put their hands on the challah and challenge them to see "who will get the biggest piece?"... And now we look back upon those idyllic days... stunned by their innocence... will we ever feel safe to do any of that again?

One year ago, we gathered for services or chose not to do so... believing that there would be another one a few weeks later... One year ago... we did not know... we never would have imagined March 2021... we did not know to be grateful for those things that we took for granted... even those of us who practiced gratitude diligently... we did not know what the future would bring to make us look back upon that last Shabbat that we spent together... with awe and wonder and sadness and grief and longing... Perhaps some of us were remembering a time prior to March 2020, and were too consumed with what was no longer, to appreciate what we had at that moment?

And so it is, March 2021... will we focus on what we have lost? Or will we focus on what

we do have? On the opportunities that have been made possible to us this year- the ability to gather through Zoom across geographic boundaries... to experience worship in a new way... the ability to gather in a way far more inclusive than anything we have ever been able to do before... ability to drive or mobility or other barriers to access suddenly gone... we can each connect to our TBY family from the comfort of our own homes...

The Torah tells us that when the Children of Israel were wandering through the desert, free for the first time in centuries, receiving revelation and being fed miraculous manna that fell from the Heavens, with perfect nourishment and a taste that changed depending on who was eating it... for children it tasted like milk and for adults it tasted like honey... and yet, the rabbis describe that the Children of Israel complained, because they missed the leeks and onions of ancient Egypt.

Indeed, contemporary psychologists tell us that this phenomenon is completely normal- it is a defense mechanism to keep us from being "fully in the present" by keeping us always looking to the past or the future... we do it to try to avoid the pain of loss by never connecting to begin with... but the sad truth is that, it keeps us from fully living... and leaves us with only regrets.

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because it is the only thing we can truly have. We are supposed to get rid of our "chametz" (left over bread). We are not supposed to put it in a cupboard and then tape it shut, so that we can use it after Passover, because then we are living for the future instead of truly embracing the experience of Passover... the experience of not having bread. Because while bread is wonderful and we bless it and thrive on it... we need to go without it, to truly appreciate it. Like the popular 1980's song, "Don't know what you got (till it's gone)", the rabbis teach that true freedom is only possible when we are fully present in the "here and now".

As we prepare for another Zoom Passover, we pray for liberation and redemption... for healing and strength... for miracles and courage... for the raging waters to split open that we may walk forward once again on dry land... But we also take this time to give thanks for those blessings that we have been given... May we learn new lessons of gratitude and appreciation that teach us new lessons of freedom. May we never take the blessings we are given for granted... postponing for an imagined tomorrow what must be treasured and savored today...


This is precisely the reason why Reform Judaism names its synagogues "temples"... when the first Jewish settlers to America arrived, they decided that this would be their land of milk and honey.. that they would live this opportunity as fully as possible... rather than waiting for a Messiah to come and help them rebuild the Temple in Jerusalem, right here and right now, they would build their temple, and do everything necessary to make this moment of time the Messianic Era.

This was our movement's founders' legacy... this was their interpretation of this same Torah wisdom that continues to challenge us in our own day... How can we embrace the opportunities of the "here and now" without wishing for something that we imagine might be better? What will we do to sanctify this unique moment in time?

As I write this article in the middle of February, there is good news on the COVID-19 front - declining numbers of cases, hospitalizations, and deaths -

and still lots of cautions. Some people are getting vaccinated, but we are also waiting to see if there will be a surge of cases following the Superbowl. And, there are recommendations to continue wearing masks, even after being vaccinated. Why? Because the evidence of what happens is too meager to know anything for sure at this point. Not everyone will have an optimal vaccine response; it's possible that even a vaccinated person could be exposed and pass something on; the variant forms might behave differently. So, as you can imagine, it's going to be difficult to come to a decision about when to re-open our building for in-person gatherings.

Here are some of my thoughts: while people over 65 are being vaccinated now, (in a very fluky, chaotic system), remember how many people there are between 64 and 18. It's not clear when they'll be included. The age group following that will be 17-12, which is a group that is apparently being tested now. I know of a 12 year old who has volunteered to be a test subject, back in Central New York. Vaccination plans for children younger than 12 are still unknown. And, of course, there are people who will not be vaccinated at all, for a variety of reasons.

Once we do gather, I believe we will still need to be wearing masks. We will probably not have food, not because food is bad, but because a buffet table such as we have at our Onegs causes people to come together without masks on. The research has shown that the virus aerosol particles can travel in the air for more than the six feet we've been trying to give each other. It's also not clear when a choir can sing together.

So, what will Temple Bet Yam do? We will consider a decision very carefully. I'm thinking we may need some committees. For instance, a committee to develop protocols for how we will gather, and perhaps a committee to figure out how we want to be in-person and somehow virtual as well - since there are always people who, for one reason or another, can't come in person.

In the meantime, we are going to celebrate our escape from Egypt! This is a theme that occurs throughout our liturgy, reminding us to remember we were slaves, and should act accordingly. Our Temple Seder this year will take place on the 14th of Nisan, as always, and will be March 27. It's a Saturday night, which is a rare occurrence. It will be on Zoom. I know we're tired of Zoom,

but we need to hang in there, until times are better. We want us to still be here when this is over (or as over as it's going to get).
